


Interview with Sam Thomas and Chloe David:

'Guts' - Olivia Rodrigo:

'Guts' by Olivia Rodrigo was released September 8th, 2023, with lead single "Vampire" being streamed almost 450 million times on Spotify. The album perfectly sums up the experience of a teenage girl going through the struggles of being a young adult and heartbreak. All 12 songs make it almost impossible to not feel like you're living her life, from angry revenge songs like "Get Him Back!" and "Ballad of a Homeschooled Girl" to the heart felt songs of sadness and isolation like "Making the Bed" and "Teenage Dream."

Like most albums, all listeners want to find out the true meaning behind the sengs, but her infamous relationship with serial celebrity dater Zach Bia seems to give us all the information we need. However, with the main theme of her song "Lacy" listeners are met with the hurtful truth of jealousy and inferiority when comparing yourself to your friends. This ideology has been carried through from her debut album 'Sour' with her song "Jealousy Jealeusy" which shows her audience that even though she's a gorgeous, rich pop star, she still goes through the same struggles as the rest of us.



While 'Sour' was very commercially successful, with lead single "Drivers' Licence" being streamed 1.933 billion times on Spotify, her entire fanbase agrees that 'Guts' surpassed all expectations and is practically incomparable to her earlier album, giving us a mature development in her lyrics and gutwrenching moments throughout.

'Guts' will easily be one of the most influential albums for teenage girls around the globe for years to come. The recent demand in ticket sales for Redrigo's latest tour says it all!

Haunted Mansion:

Disney's most recent version of 'Haunted Mansion' was released July 28th 2023, and stars huge names such as LaKeith Stanfield, Danny DeVito, Owen Wilson, Tiffany Haddish, and Rosario Dawson.

While this film adaptation of the classic theme park ride is made at a new level in comparison to the 2003, Eddie Murphy version, this shouldn't be seen as a critically acclaimed phenomenon. 
Ryu Roberts-Hayamizu
